
2020 Summer Reading Requirements For Students Entering Grade 5





Dear Students and Parents/Guardians,

Summer is here and many students are looking forward to a break from schoolwork, but summer is not a time to take a break from reading!

Research tells us that when students don't read for two months their skills regress. Research done at Harvard University by James Kim has shown that even reading 4 or 5 books over the summer helps to prevent the summer slide. Reading is a skill which requires practice, just like baseball or playing an instrument. Summer reading helps students of all ages keep their skills sharp so they are ready when school begins again in the fall.

All students are expected to read a minimum of <u>AT LEAST TWO BOOKS</u> over the summer, <u>ONE OF WHICH IS A REQUIRED TITLE</u>. All students entering 5th grade are asked to read *BECAUSE OF MR. TERUPT* by Rob Buyea. The required read is tied to the theme of treating others with respect, accepting differences, and overcoming obstacles. This minimum requirement of two books will count as a homework grade. In addition, during the first full week of school, all ELA classes will have a graded assignment based on the required summer reading book.

However, we are encouraging all students to read <u>beyond the minimum requirement and double their efforts by reading four or more</u>

<u>books</u>. Any student who doubles their efforts will have their name entered into a raffle to win <u>\$50 in free books</u> during the first Scholastic

Book Fair of the year which will be held in November. One student from each grade level will be selected to win.

Wherever your summer days take you, bring along a good book, and read, read!



Requirements

- 1. Students entering grade 5 in September are required to read Because of Mr. Terupt by Rob Buyea.
- 2. As students read **Because of Mr. Terupt**, they are asked to complete the required response pages in their reading log (see pages 7-9).
- 3. Next, students need to select <u>at least one other book to read</u> during the summer. We have included a list of suggested authors and titles as a guide, but feel free to select authors and titles that may not appear on the list.
- 4. For each book read, students record the title and author, as well as a brief response.

 Responses can take any **one** of the following forms:
 - ❖ Write a brief summary of the book (Who? What? Where? When? Why? How? So, what?).
 - ❖ Write a book recommendation/critique, describing why someone may or may not be interested in reading that book.
 - Share your thoughts, a reaction, or a connection you made to a character or event in the story, or to the information you may have learned.
 - ❖ Draw or sketch a favorite or interesting part of the book with a brief caption.
- 5. Parents/guardians will need to sign on the line provided in the reading log for each book the student completes.
- 6. During the first week of school in the September, students will hand their reading logs in to their homeroom teachers.
- 7. **Students who read a minimum of two books will receive credit for their first homework assignment of 5th grade**. Students who read four or more books will be entered into a drawing to win \$50 in free books at the first Scholastic Book Fair to be held in the Fall.




